CALL OF ACTION FOR PARLIAMENTARIANS

APHR's new report <u>Parliamentarians at risk: Reprisals against opposition</u> <u>MPs in Southeast Asia</u> sheds light on how the governments of the Philippines, Thailand, and increasingly Malaysia, are using a range of tactics to intimidate and harass opposition MPs including:

- The filing of trumped-up criminal charges,
- Arbitrary removal of parliamentary status,
- Surveillance and threats,
- Government-backed disinformation campaigns, and
- Sexist campaigns of vilification.

Since 2018, at least 27 opposition MPs have faced judicial harassment.

These reprisals not only violate the fundamental rights of those targeted, but also restrict civic space, weaken parliament representativity and undermine democratic representation.

As a fellow MP you can help push back against the silencing of lawmakers.

STEP 1: TAKE ACTION

Use your position in parliament: ask official questions, initiate factfindings or inquiries, or use privilege speech, to ask your government about actions it is taking on the human rights violations faced by lawmakers;

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Systematically **call for the immediate and unconditional release of Philippine Senator Leila de Lima** in and outside of parliament;



Work to **amend all laws** that restrict the rights to freedom of expression, association, and peaceful assembly to bring them in line with international human rights law and standards; and
